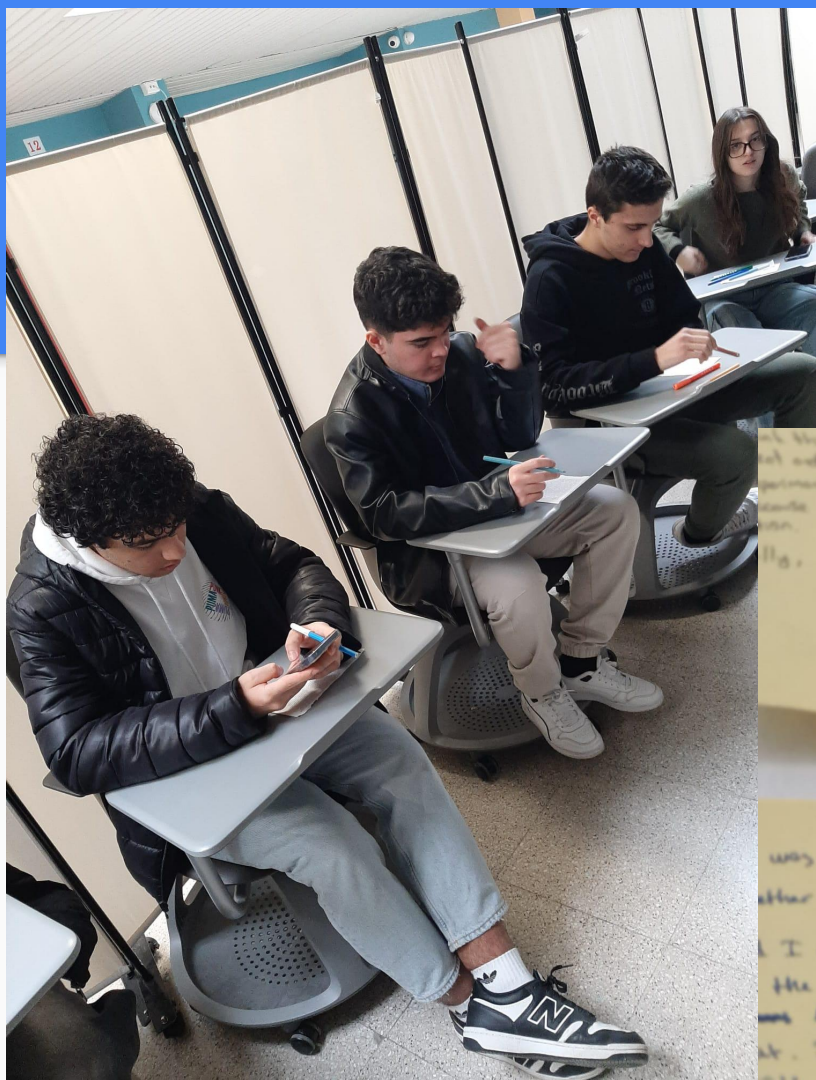








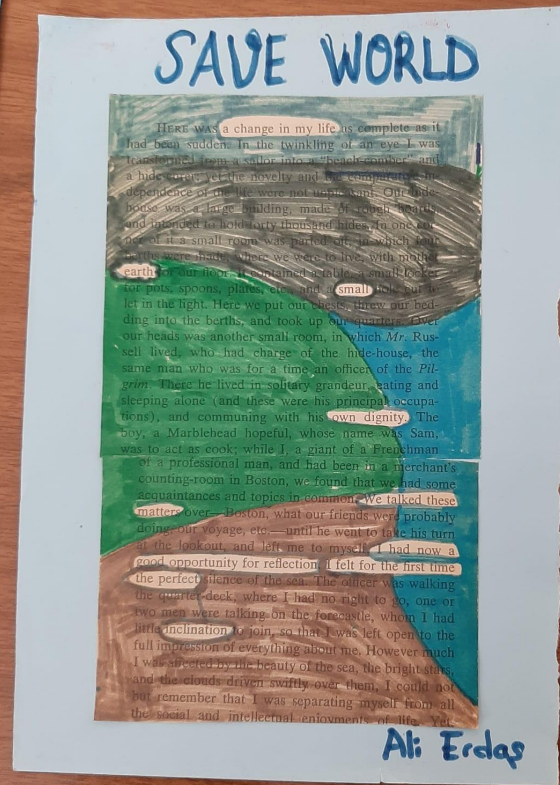

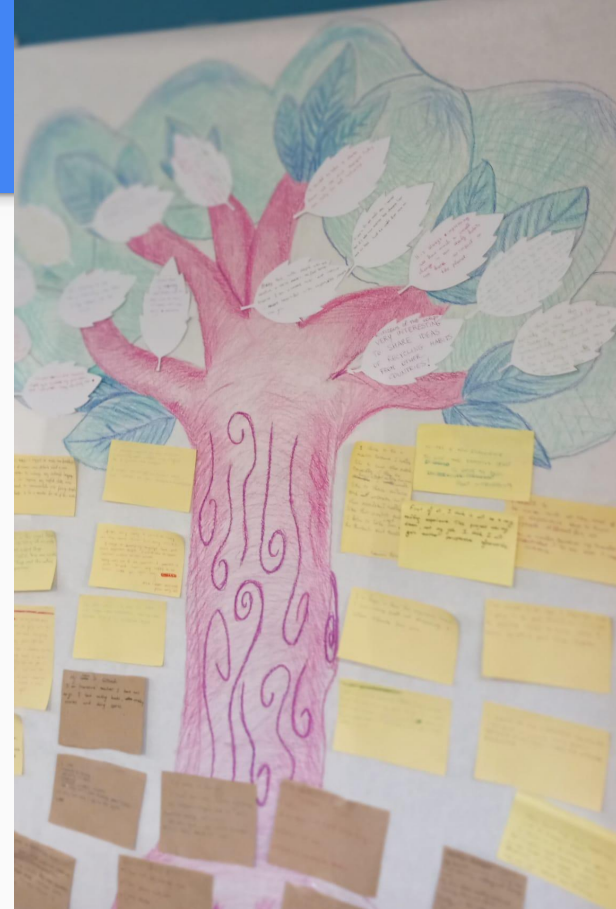

Parliament meeting more often. The common people's representatives got into the habit of meeting privately to discuss their business before they joined the lords. By 1350 they also had a speaker, whose duty was to communicate their agreed opinions to the lords. Over the next ten years Parliament divided into three parts: a House of Commons, a House of Lords and a small permanent council composed of the King's advisers.

Edward III was quite content to increase Parliament's powers as long as it supported his wars. As for the Commons, they considered wars to be the king's business, but they were happy to pay for them as they brought some profit to country. They were well aware of the importance of the ports of Calais and Bordeaux to English commerce. The common people's representatives who filled the Commons were also involved with matters such as order and justice. In fact for some time these men had been used as unpaid servants of the crown to keep public order everywhere. Edward now appointed them Justices of the Peace and gave them the local powers of his sheriffs and judges.

Although Edward continued to make conquests in France, he was unable to maintain them, as the Black Death struck again and before his fifty year reign had come to an end in 1377, the Black Prince and some of his best captains were dead. France was lost again, except for Calais, Bordeaux and a few other ports.

The heir to the throne was Edward's grandson, Richard II. However, as Richard was only ten years old at the time of his grandfather's death, his uncle, John of Gaunt ruled in his name and became Steward of England. John of Gaunt tried hard to re-establish the authority of the Steward: the manager of the kingdom.

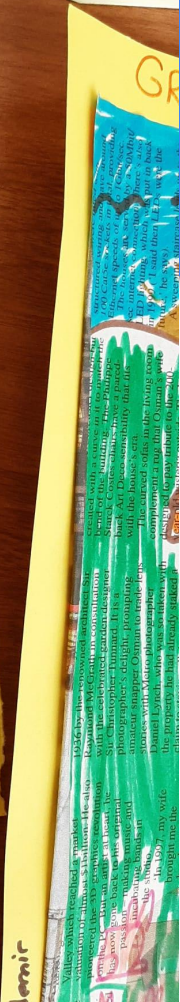

Reaching the brow of the hill, where the car stood, we found several piles of hides, and Indians sitting round them. One or two other carts were coming slowly on from the mission, and the captain told us to begin and throw the hides down. 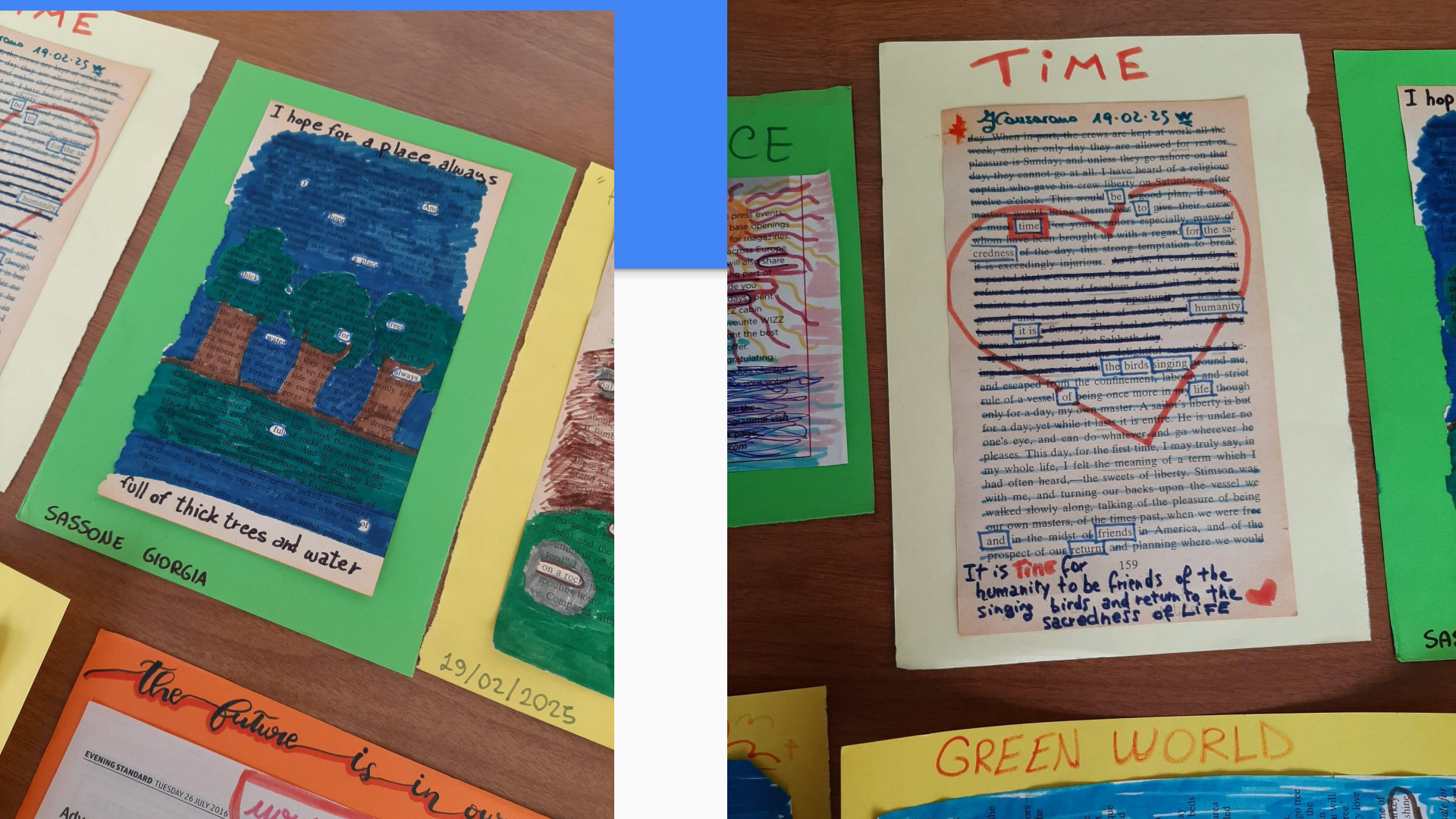
